We are pleased to share with you the 2019 Summer Youth Enrichment Program (SYEP) Annual Report for Prince George's County. This report celebrates the historic investment in our young people made by County Government and our partners in the public, private, nonprofit, and faith-based sectors. Collectively, we created pathways to prosperity for young people ages 14-22 by providing free job readiness and career development training, along with a paid summer employment experience.

During this program year, we made great strides in enhancing the SYEP experience for our young people. Some of our program highlights include:

- Lifting the two (2) year participation maximum;
- Hiring 6,943 youth to participate in employment opportunities and receive an enriching experience;
- Expanding the age range to include young people ages 14 through 22;
- Creating ten (10) capstones in various career areas for youth ages 14 and 15; and
- Providing job readiness training to 4,000 youth with the assistance of our County-based small businesses and Prince George's Community College (PGCC).

The best investment for our County's future is an investment in our young people. Thank you to all of our partners who helped us significantly expand the scope of SYEP and make this year's program a success. We are Prince George's Proud to share with you some of our successes and the great work completed by our young people this summer, and we look forward to your continued support of SYEP.



The Prince George's County **Youth@Work/Summer Youth Enrichment Program (SYEP)** is a nationally recognized youth development initiative funded locally and through private partners that provides County youth ages 14 to 22 with enriching and constructive summer work experiences through job placements in the public, private, non-profit, and faith-based sectors. Our goal is to positively impact youth in a way that will last for their entire lifetime through the SYEP employment and training program.

Through the SYEP, we strive to provide eligible youth with the opportunity to:

- Earn money and gain meaningful work experience;
- Learn and develop the skills, attitudes, and commitment necessary to succeed in today's world of work through job readiness training and positive relationships with working adults; and
- Gain exposure to a diverse range of careers in industries such as Government and Civil Service; Information Technology; Arts, Design and Media; Community and Social Services; Construction; Healthcare Support; Building and Grounds Maintenance; Hospitality and Tourism; Office and Administration Support; and more.

Prince George's County SYEP was awarded the National Association of Counties (NACo) 2018 Achievement Award for the innovation and effectiveness of a county government program that strengthens services for residents in the category of Children and Youth. The program is designed to provide County youth with an increased awareness of employment opportunities while mentoring and educating them on the necessity of personal and professional development.

The goal of SYEP is to engage youth with a meaningful summer work experience in their area of interest to potentially integrate them into a full-time career at public agencies, private, non-profit organizations, and the faith-based sector.

SYEP ONLINE APPLICATION EVENTS

As part of The Honorable Angela D. Alsobrooks, County Executive's initiative to employ more youth, the Office of Community Relations held several outreach events in the County. Locations were set up at churches and libraries with computers to allow youth to complete the SYEP employment application online. The following locations participated:

- New Carrollton Library
- Oxon Hill Library
- Tree of Life Christian Ministries in partnership with The Honorable Sydney J. Harrison, County Council Member (District 9)

There was an outpouring of youth attending these events—resulting in **10,057** SYEP applications received for 2019.

SYEP CALL CENTER

With the goal of employing 6,000 youth this year, in collaboration with the Office of Community Relations' 311 Call Center, a new SYEP Call Center was created to answer calls coming into the SYEP Hotline. Call center representatives answered questions regarding the application process, job readiness training, job assignments, payroll, and general program information. The Call Center, with a staff of nine representatives, operated from February 1, 2019 to August 30, 2019, and received a total of **17,605** calls.

JOB FAIRS AND JOB SOURCING

In collaboration with Employ Prince George's, the SYEP held multiple job sourcing events. Various job fairs were held throughout the duration of the program, where employers from around the Washington, DC metropolitan area offered SYEP youth participants employment opportunities.



2019 SYEP KICK-OFF EVENT



On June 17, 2019, the Office of the County Executive and the SYEP Team hosted a kick-off event to celebrate the start of the 2019 program. The event was held at the Show Place Arena in Upper Marlboro, MD, and featured special guests and musical performances. More than 1,800 youth participated in this celebration.

The mistress of ceremonies for the event was Little Bacon Bear, DJ personality from 93.9 WKYS, who spun the audience with her perky personality. A special guest appearance was made by NFL wide receiver, Brandon Coleman, who interacted with the crowd and allowed youth a chance to take a photo with him and his Super Bowl ring. The audience was entertained by a musical performance by FAME (Foundation Advancement of Music & Education) and a dance routine by Taritibu Youth Association Step Team.

The Honorable Angela Alsobrooks, County Executive, Shawn Y. Stokes, Director, Office of Human Resources Management, Erica Berry Wilson, Special Assistant to the Deputy Chief Administrative Officer for Health, Human Services and Education, and Walter Simmons, President and CEO of Employ Prince George's addressed the youth regarding summer employment and career advancement opportunities.

Youth speakers and SYEP interns, Benjamin Sinclair and Justin McNeil, provided highlights from their SYEP experience. Both youth began working in the program several years ago—and because of their outstanding leadership skills received during their experiences with the SYEP, they were hired as Citizen Services Interns with the Office of Information Technology.

2019 CAPSTONE PROGRAMS

This year, the SYEP launched Capstone Programs for youth from 14 to 22 years of age with job training and opportunities to explore one of nine career fields listed. Notably, of the 1,164 Capstone participants, 92 percent were ages 14 and 15.

BEAUTIFICATION	CULINARY ARTS, HOSPITALITY & GAMING	CYBER SECURITY
Designed to expose youth to government and environmental careers by engaging with specific environmental issues of importance, such as global warming. The youth participated in hands-on activities to help keep Prince George's County beautiful and clean, and to teach others in the community to do the same.	Focused on Culinary Arts and Hospitality Services for ages 14 and 15, and Gaming for youth ages 18 and older. The youth were divided into groups to resemble the four departments found in most hotels: marketing, event planning, VIP services, and culinary.	Introduced participants to the field of Information Technology (IT), targeting the concepts of cloud computing and cyber security. The youth were also introduced to the design thinking methodology, which helped them develop problem solving and critical thinking skills to address real-world IT problems.
ENERGY	ENTREPRENEURSHIP	HEALTHCARE
Brought together hands-on science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) exploration with presentations by career professionals and field experiences. It allowed the youth to better understand the energy resources around them and their connection to the global energy picture.	Developed to empower youth to facilitate change in their communities and to enable new business formation. The curriculum included the delivery of life skills and the fundamentals of web design or user experience design.	Introduced youth to the Health and Bio Sciences field. Participants learned about genetic disorders and rare diseases and conducted real-world laboratory experiments to understand how and if DNA impacts rare disorders.
HOMELAND SECURITY	KEYS EXPLORERS	TRADE
Introduced the youth to emergency preparedness protocols and procedures. Youth engaged in mock field operation trainings engaged in mock field operation trainings and exercises. The youth also learned emergency disaster response procedures, how to prioritize causalities, and how to organize shelter-in-place safe areas.	Designed to allow participants to explore occupations, education and training requirements, salaries, growth projections and opportunities within specific industries that are in high demand in Prince George's County. The youth were exposed to 11 different in-demand industries.	Created to address the critical workforce development demands that exist in Prince George's County. The trades that participated included painters, drywall finishers, glaziers, ironworkers, electricians, plumbers, and insulators.

Approximately 4,000 youth ages 14 to 22 participated in SYEP's free Job Readiness Training (JRT) programs that were offered by Prince George's Community College, Forward Movement Enterprises, The Training Source, Hillside Youth Employment Training Academy (YETA), Latin American Center/Maryland Multicultural Youth Centers (LAYC/MMYC), Urban Alliance, and Youth CareerConnect. During JRT, youth learned essential skills to ensure their success in the workplace. Youth who completed JRT received a summer job hiring preference.



SYEP SUCCESS STORIES

Reno Brown, an employee at the Department of the Environment (DoE), Stormwater Management Division, had the privilege to work with some wonderful young individuals in the SYEP program within his division. Their summer youth completed DoE storm drain stenciling projects, the Junior Achievement Finance Park program and a final Stormwater Management Presentation at Corvias. Mr. Brown stated that every year he has worked in this program, he has noticed personal growth in the young adults and believes that this is a great way to start them off in their careers and in life.

The Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) - Community Planning and Development (CPD) Division was honored to have Jasmine Wilson, SYEP Intern for the Summer of 2019. Jasmine, a sophomore at Eleanor Roosevelt High School, began to assist CPD staff members immediately by responding to telephone inquiries, providing file management and using logic to solve a filing challenge. She designed a side-by-side illustration of the current layout of the file system and of how the files rearrangement would appear. Jasmine provided copies of her plan and gave a presentation to the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) staff, where she promoted the file accessibility and making available space for future files if we selected her plan. Cheers from the team began immediately, and everyone agreed to the file management plan. Jasmine was able to participate in the first phase of the rearrangement, and the following week the project was completed.

Jasmine is a gifted artist and someday she aspires to become an entrepreneur. Using her talents, Jasmine designed the upcoming CDBG Instructions and Application covers for the Program Year 46, which will debut on September 17, 2019, at the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) Application-Proposal Workshop. The covers acknowledge her accomplishments by listing her as the designer. Also, during her tenure at DHCD, Jasmine attended debriefing sessions and preconstruction with CDBG staff and subrecipients meetings held at DHCD. She also met with the Acting Director and provided an oral overview of her assignments, as well as presented her accomplishments during the DHCD SYEP Interns' year end meeting with managers and supervisors. Her calm, professional manner and attention to details are very impressive.



a.i. Solutions is a NASA contractor located in Lanham, Maryland, that agreed to be a private sector employer partner with the Prince George's County Youth@Work/Summer Youth Enrichment Program (SYEP) in 2019. Through their partnership with the SYEP, a.i. Solutions committed to hiring four interns. Through a partnership between Employ Prince George's and the Prince George's County Office of Human Resources Management, a.i. Solutions was provided 30 resumes of youth ages 18 and older. a.i. Solutions interviewed 21 of the 30 possible candidates and hired four.

One of the four youth hired by a.i. Solutions was Anthony Terry. Anthony was a recent college graduate with a major in Mathematics. Anthony enrolled in the SYEP due to his inability to gain employment after graduating from college. Anthony impressed his supervisors at a.i. Solutions and received positive reports throughout the 2019 SYEP program. Due to Anthony's stellar performance during the 2019 SYEP program, a.i. Solutions offered Anthony a full-time position at the company. Anthony was offered a position as a Junior Software Engineer with a salary of \$75,000 per year.




