





SHREDDING EVENT **DRAWS 2,700 VEHICLES**

More than 2,700 participants did their part to keep their sensitive documents out of the hands of dumpster-diving thieves and out of the landfill by participating in the NBC4 Allstate Community Shred Event on Saturday, Sept. 6 at Prince George's Community College. Open to the Washington D.C. metro community, the free shred, held in partnership with Prince George's County Government, NBC4, Allstate, Shred-it and the college invites participants to bring up to five archive boxes or paper bags of documents for onsite shredding. But protecting identify theft isn't the event's only benefit; it's also good for the environment.

"This event not only highlights the importance of destroying personal documents properly, it provides a great environmental benefit with the recycling of the shredded materials, boxes and paper bags by keeping them out of our landfill," said Adam Ortiz, DoE Director.

This year's event resulted in more than 49 tons of recycled and shredded paper and cardboard that was kept out of the local landfill. Thanks to all who participated and did their part to stop crime and to protect the environment.



LAUREL LAKES DREDGING

ity of Laurel residents will soon notice a great deal of activity at Laurel Lakes. To ensure that the popular body of water continues to function properly and remains beautiful and clean, the Prince George's County Department of the Environment (DoE) is dredging the lake. This project includes the removal of sediment or "muck" that has settled at the bottom of the lake.

Designed and built in 1986, the daily purpose of the man-made lake is to filter stormwater (rain or melted snow) and prevent stormwater runoffpollutants such as sediment, oil and grease-from entering local streams and rivers. Inspections are done by the County to make certain that the lake cleans stormwater effectively, sediment storage levels below three feet, properly releases water and prevents downstream flooding and erosion. Lake dredging is conducted once sediment storage levels reach three feet or higher.

The dredging project, which will also include the planting of new trees along the lake's walking trail, will be completed in spring 2015. For more information, contact DoE at (301) 883-5810.

The Prince George's County Department of the Environment (DoE) recently Iaunched a new program to help enhance County residents' knowledge of sustainable environmental practices that they can carry out and manage at their homes.

The Clean Water, Clear Choices Program includes hands-on, do-it-yourself classes and workshops that focus on stormwater pollution and rain barrel installations. During the Stormwater Pollution Audit class, participants learn how to improve the quality of stormwater runoff (rain or melted snow) that flows over the land picking up pollutants such as oil, grease, sediment and nutrients. The class will also explain how to address stormwater issues such as erosion or ponding. Taking action to address stormwater runoff can save homeowners money, beautify their yards and help keep water clean for drinking, fishing and boating.

The Rain Barrel Demonstration class includes a live, step-by-step assembly and installation of a rain barrel, which collects rooftop runoff using a gutter/ downspout system. It provides a free supply of water containing no chlorine, lime or calcium, making it ideal for a wide variety of uses including watering the lawn, gardens and window washing.

Lawn and garden watering make up nearly 40 percent of total household water use during the summer. Using a rain barrel will save most homeowners about 1,300 gallons of water during the peak summer months. Saving water not only helps protect the environment, it saves you money and energy. Diverting water from storm drains also decreases the impact of stormwater in streams and rivers.

COUNTY PROGRAM GETS TREE-VITALIZED!

The revitalized Prince George's County Tree ReLeaf Grant Program is off to a "tree-mendous" start. Relaunched this summer, The City of College Park was one of the first municipalities to participate in the grant program and receive \$4,000 to assist with the planting of 46 native trees and shrubs in the right-of-ways along city streets.

This fall, more than 250 native trees and shrubs will be planted in three communities including 65 trees at Lake Arbor Eponymous Lake in Largo, and 110 shrubs and trees in the Windsor Green neighborhood in Greenbelt. An "edible forest" containing 75 trees bearing fruit, nuts, herbs and vegetables will be planted in Riverdale.

> Edible forests are low-maintenance, sustainable woodland communities that produce plant-based food for human consumption. Through the use of companion planting-the close planting of different plants that enhance growth and protection from pests—the forests can be intermixed to grow in a succession of layers and form a woodland habitat.

> > The grant program, administered by the Prince George's County Department of the Environment (DoE), focuses on increasing the number of trees in the County by planting new trees. It's a great way to improve the environment and enhance the natural beauty and health of our communities. County municipalities, home owner associations and nonprofit groups are eligible for the program.

What about your neighborhood? Is there an outdoor space that could be enhanced with more shade or even an edible forest? This is a good time to start planning for spring planting and DoE can help!

Many residents participate in, and benefit from, the County's curbside recycling program. However, a majority of those participants live in singlefamily homes. Unfortunately, residents living in apartment and condominium communities, also known as multi-family dwellings (MFDs), are unable to take advantage of curbside recycling offered by the County because:

• Programs for individual households are not suited to MFDs; • Private waste haulers, not local government, typically provide waste management services to MFDs;

To overcome recycling challenges, and encourage residents to reuse and recycle, the Prince George's County Department of the Environment (DoE) is working with MFDs community leaders and management companies to establish recycling programs for plastic, metal, glass and paper. DoE is offering support and assistance to MFDs that will assist with program design and education, help increase recycling rates in these communities and identify recycling opportunities. DON'T BE LEFT OUT... **YOU TOO CAN RECYCLE!**

With a population of approximately 863,500, Prince George's County is the third most populated jurisdiction in the Washington, D.C. metropolitan area. Since 2000, the number of County residents has increased by seven percent. As the population has grown, so has the amount of trash generated and collected throughout the County.

• Many MFD buildings were not designed with recycling in mind; and • MFDs typically have little space in individual units and in common areas for the collection and storage of recyclables

> Prince George's County passed laws that require MFDs to have programs up and running by October 1, 2014.

> Recycling offers MFD communities the ability to reduce costs associated with private garbage collection while positively contributing to the protection of our environment. When we reuse our materials we conserve our precious natural resources. Recycling also requires significantly less energy and creates less pollution than the processing of virgin materials. Multi-family dwelling recycling is another step in helping keep Prince George's County beautiful.
