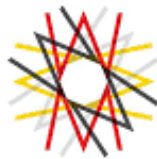

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DIRECT SERVICES ORGANIZATIONS

AMARA LEGAL CENTER

Mission: To provide free legal services to individuals whose rights have been violated through commercial sex.

Population: Survivors of sex trafficking and individuals harmed through involvement in commercial sex. Note that Amara will also accept referrals from labor trafficking victims for state-level (not immigration) services.

Services: Free legal services to individuals whose rights have been violated through commercial sex through criminal defense, criminal record sealing, victim witness advocacy, divorce, custody and child support, civil protection orders, and name change. For all other legal issues, Amara will work to find a pro bono attorney to represent the client (for example, civil suits against traffickers and medical malpractice cases). Amara practices in DC, MD and Northern Virginia.

Mission: Catholic Charities is the social ministry outreach of the Archdiocese of Washington.

Population: Foreign and domestic trafficking victims

Services: The Trafficking Victims Human Assistance Program provides trauma-informed care to foreign-born survivors of human trafficking. Multi-lingual, culturally competent staff seamlessly connect survivors to appropriate in-house transition services, including mental health, medical clinic, shelter, and refugee assistance. Assistance includes help with basic needs (food, clothing, housing, etc.), legal services, basic primary medical and dental care, family reunification, financial support and referral to partner agencies. We also have an art-based women's group, which promotes peer-to-peer support and psychoeducation.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND SEXUAL ASSAULT CENTER (DVSAC) AT UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND CAPITAL REGION HEALTH

HUMAN TRAFFICKING PREVENTION PROJECT (HTPP) – UNIVERSITY OF BALTIMORE SCHOOL OF LAW & MARYLAND VOLUNTEER LAWYERS SERVICE

Mission: The Human Trafficking Prevention Project (HTPP) focuses on reducing the collateral consequences of criminal justice involvement for survivors of human trafficking and those populations made most vulnerable to exploitation. The HTPP is a partnership between the University of Baltimore School of Law and the Maryland Volunteer Lawyers Service (MVLS), Maryland's largest provider of pro bono legal services. MVLS attorneys and UB Law student

attorneys represent survivors of sex trafficking seeking to vacate, or, set aside, their prostitution convictions under Maryland's 2011 "vacating convictions" law, as well as provide representation to survivors and populations at risk of future exploitation in expungement and shielding cases. MVLS also provides HTPP clients with access to civil legal services to address family law, housing, consumer debt, tax, and other legal matters.

Population: Services are free of charge and are provided regardless of age, race, ethnicity, biological/assigned sex, immigration status, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

Services: Legal services for survivors of human trafficking and individuals at risk of exploitation seeking to vacate, expunge, or shield prostitution and other related charges on their criminal records; civil legal assistance with family law, housing, consumer debt, tax, and other legal matters; training for pro bono volunteers attorneys and firms seeking to provide legal services to HTPP clients; training and technical assistance to service providers on the availability of post-conviction relief within the state of Maryland, as well as on working with survivors of trauma and other marginalized populations; input on state or federal legislation that impacts survivors of trafficking and those at greatest risk for exploitation, with a focus on criminal justice reform, human rights, and harm reduction principles.

Mission: The Sexual Assault Legal Institute's (SALI) mission, as part of the Maryland Coalition Against Sexual Assault (MCASA), is to help prevent sexual assault, advocate for accessible, compassionate care for survivors of sexual violence, and work to hold offenders accountable.

Population: Victims and survivors of sex trafficking and sexual assault and abuse. SALI is a statewide program and serves both children and adults.

Services: SALI provides direct legal services for survivors for legal issues related to sexual assault/abuse, including peace orders/protective orders, immigration (including U and T visas), employment, education, civil rights, family law, crime victim rights, and other matters. SALI also provides legal training and technical assistance for rape crisis centers and other professionals working with survivors, including presentations on civil legal needs of sexual assault survivors, sexual crimes and victim rights in the criminal justice system, and legal issues for sexual crimes victims who are under 18.

THE SAMARITAN WOMEN (BALTIMORE)

Mission: The Samaritan Women is a Christian residential program providing assessment, restorative, and graduate care for survivors of domestic sex trafficking.

Population: Adult women survivors of sex trafficking from anywhere in the United States.

Services: A five-phase Continuum of Care model that includes full-service residential and primary care; comprehensive case management including legal, medical, mental health, social services, financial, etc.; group and individual trauma counseling; on-site Schoolhouse offering GED and college classes; on-site vocational training program and business microenterprise; life skills training; spiritual formation and instruction; recreation and personal enrichment

Services operate out of three residential properties and the full program can be up to four years of supportive care.

AGENCY SUPPORT SERVICES

PRINCE GEORGE'S COUNTY DEPARTMENT OF FAMILY SERVICES DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND HUMAN TRAFFICKING DIVISION

Mission: The Domestic Violence and Human Trafficking Division assists in the coordination of services and programs for individuals impacted by domestic violence, human trafficking, and sexual assault. The division collaborates with stakeholders, identifies gaps in services, educates, and develops programs and services to meet the unique needs of the community.

Population: Residents of Prince George's County who are victims/survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking.

Services: Prince George's County Department of Family Services, Domestic Violence and Human Trafficking Division provides resource referrals, free and confidential services for victims/survivors of domestic violence, human trafficking, and sexual assault. Domestic violence services include resource referrals, safety planning, relocation assistance, advocacy, assistance with housing and navigating the public housing system. Human trafficking services include resource referrals, education, and prevention training. Survivors work with trained advocates.

The Housing Resource Center - Provides a safe place to get free housing advice and assistance (regarding programs, housing options, housing rights, and protective orders), referrals for counseling, benefits, and other immediate needs. The Community Housing Resource Coordinator accepts calls for referral information Monday - Friday, 8:30 a.m. - 5:00 p.m.
