




THE ANACOSTIA RIVER WATERSHED



The Anacostia River flows from Prince George's and Montgomery counties into Washington, D.C. where it joins the Washington Channel to empty into the Potomac River at Buzzard Point. It is approximately 8.7 miles. The name 'Anacostia' derives from the area's early history as Nacotchtank, a settlement of Native Americans along the banks of the Anacostia River.

The Anacostia River watershed is home to than 800,000 people, 43 species of fish and some 200 species of birds. It covers more than 176 square miles in eastern Montgomery County and northern Prince George's County and the eastern half of Washington, D.C.


RESTORATION PROGRESS MAP
