


DIRECTOR'S CORNER

April is more than just the celebration of April Fools; it is also the Prince George's County Department of the Environment (DoE) celebration of Earth Month! A celebration born out of the recognition of Earth Day this April 22nd.

Earth Month Celebration spotlights the importance of taking care of our planet through simple sustainable daily actions such as recycling right, not littering, picking up after our pets, avoiding soil contamination, caring for our waterways, and avoiding the misuse of natural resources.

From a young age, we are all attracted to play with earth surrounding us. CLIMATE CHANGE ON PLANTS AND POLLINATORS

Have you noticed some plants are blooming earlier than in past years? Or maybe you notice the wild fluctuation in temperatures–70 degrees one day and 30 the next? All these changes affect every living thing including plants, trees, and pollinators that help supply our food sources.

Flowers blooming early is out of sync with the emergence of pollinators that depend on their nectar and pollen, or pollinators may emerge earlier because of warming temperatures and starve because their plant food is not available yet. This can have an impact on our food source since 85 percent of our food comes from pollination. Pollinators will need to adapt to warmer winters and earlier spring conditions or migrate to regions where the conditions are more preferred for their emergence. This may present problems if the preferred plants are not available in that region. Further migration and loss of habitat may lead to extinction as their range and population become too small to avoid extinction.

As the climate warms in this region, plants that require a longer cold period will eventually disappear from this region or will be struggling to survive under heat-related stress and will be prone to infestation and diseases. There will be more demand for water when we have extended periods of drought. Plants that are used to warmer weather further south will become naturalized in this region as the temperature rises and insects and diseases that were part of a warmer climate will make this region home. Native trees that have evolved in this region will be key to providing shade during the hot summers and help mitigate the flooding conditions that will come with torrential rainfalls during the coming years.

If you hate weeding, get used to it because weeds, especially the invasive kind, will be more prevalent. They will claim more vacant, unattended land, our forests, and eventually creep into your gardens and yards. We cannot change nor control the weather but there are some areas we can control to lessen the impact of climate change on plants and pollinators.

- Buy more plants that are native to Maryland and this area
- Plant more native trees in your yard
- Provide nesting habitat for bees, butterflies, and bats
- Use manual, electric, or battery-operated lawnmowers, trimmers, and blowers
- Reduce your need for large lawns and use more groundcovers
- Enrich your soil with compost and recycle leaves or grass clippings back into the soil, which will make for healthier soil and plants
- Be ever diligent about invasive plants and insects that threaten to push out and destroy native species and their habitat
- Have an open mind about what is happening in this region, the country and the world regarding stormwater, extreme temperature fluctuations, and the frequency of violent storms
- Be more observant and educate yourselves on what is happening in nature as well as climatic changes

CLIMATE CHANGE AND YOU

Climate change describes a change in the average weather pattern in a particular area over a long period of time. Science and data offer compelling evidence that the climate is changing. We are experiencing the impacts of this change now (e.g. heatwaves and frequent intense storm events). These impacts and others will grow exceedingly worse in the absence of action to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and build climate resilience.

Actions great and small will help us to achieve carbon neutrality and prepare us to withstand, as well as recover from extreme weather events. Opting to travel via bus or train; investing in energy-efficient upgrades for your home; walking and biking; planting a large or small tree (yes, small trees have benefits); composting food scraps, and community gardening are just a few practices that you can adopt today to start building towards our climate resilient future.

Prince George's County and the State of Maryland offer programs and services to help you get started. Check out the programs below.

Air temperature has risen 2.50 farenheit in Maryland over the past century with the warmest and second warmest years being 2012 and 2020. Also annual precipitation in the State exceeded the long-term average for observation period 1995 - 20201.



Since the County launched the improved bulky trash collection program for residential curbside service, residents are encouraged to donate their used furniture and other large household items before placing their materials out at the curb. Re-creating something from an unwanted item, also known as upcycling, is a fun and cost-effective alternative to the landfill.

Reuse means to find new ways to use things that would be thrown out. Many non-profit organizations within the County accept donations, such as Community Forklift, Goodwill, and Purple Heart. To find a list of other donation centers, check out **bit.ly/reuseinpgc**.

You can also check with local churches and daycare centers to see if you can donate an item you no longer need, or something you might think is not "good" anymore. It's always a great feeling knowing you donated something that could help another person or family. Also, what you might think is "old" might be the perfect "something" or "retro" item for someone else.

Upcycling, a type of recycling, means turning something old and useless into something new and valuable. Upcycle an old or unwanted piece of furniture, and it could save you lots of money! When re-decorating a room or your house, focus on the color pallet of the look you wish to achieve. Many things can be painted to create an entire "new" look to fit perfectly into your new décor scheme.

If you are good at arts and crafts, buy fabric or use old drapes or bedspreads and dive into a project of reupholstering chairs, sofas, and ottomans. If you are a newbie, do not be afraid of embarking on doing something you have never tried before. After all, if you "mess up," you plan to discard the item anyway.

Instead, try again, "phone a friend," or look up one of the many video tutorials on the web today. Accomplishing a project like this - creating something new out of something old - is very satisfying and provides a sense of accomplishment.

Consider moving old tables and chairs to an outdoor patio area instead of purchasing new furniture. Exterior paint can be used to coat tables or chairs to help withstand the weather elements. These are just a few ideas to take something old and make it new and useful again. Remember, one person's trash is another person's treasure, and it could very well be your treasure!

Source Reduction Tip:

Reduce water usage, prevent soil erosion, and reduce the use of herbicides in your home gardens by applying mulch.

- · Self-loaders must bring their own shovels, pitch forks, bags, containers and/or tarps to secure/transport the material.
- Only non-commercial vehicles, 3/4-ton maximum weight are permitted. No business vehicle signage will be permitted, all commercial signs should be covered or removed prior to entering


PGCLITTERTRAK VIRTUAL TRAININGS

PGCLitterTRAK app assists County residents, community organizations, and businesses in reporting trash and debris collected during individual and group cleanup events. A series of virtual trainings were held in April, but residents can learn when future sessions may be held by visiting **bit.ly/PGCLitterTRAK**.



PGCLitterTRAK is a smartphone application (app) that can be used by community groups and individual citizens that are interested in reporting their efforts to reduce litter in their communities.

This easy smartphone app will take you through a series of questions that will allow us to collect data on your contribution towards a cleaner, greener Prince George's County.



Finally...

Data collected from **PGCLitterTRAK** goes into an online map for reporting and analysis. The County then gets an accurate snapshot of all the work we're doing removing litter from our neighborhoods!



RAIN CHECK REBATE AND STEWARDSHIP GRANTS PROGRAM

DoE is committed to improving the quality of life for its communities by promoting green solutions to stormwater runoff.

Stormwater runoff occurs when rain (or snowmelt) flows over impervious surfaces, picking up pollutants such as oil, grease, sediment, and nutrients that make their way into local streams and rivers. As part of that commitment, DoE developed innovative programs to provide opportunities and incentives to property owners, nonprofit organizations, and others to participate in local water quality improvements. Two of these programs are the Rain Check Rebate Program and the Stormwater Stewardship Grant program.

Rain Check Rebate Program

The Rain Check Rebate Program allows property owners to receive rebates for installing 'Rain Check' approved practices. Homeowners, businesses, and nonprofit entities (including housing cooperatives and churches) can recoup some of the costs of installing practices covered by the program.

Seven stormwater practices are eligible for rebates: rain barrels, cisterns, rain gardens, urban tree canopy, pavement removal, permeable pavement, and green roofs. The total maximum rebate amount for the property's lifetime is \$6,000 for residential properties and \$20,000 for commercial, industrial, and institutional properties. An applicant may complete multiple projects until the total maximum rebate amount is met. Projects whose costs exceed the rebate allowance per practice or maximum rebate amount for the property must have separate funding to pay for the difference.

So far through the third quarter the FY22 fiscal year, the County's Rain Check Rebate Program Performance stands at:

• BMPs installed: 81

• Rebates awarded: \$41,885

Join others in your community who are installing 'Rain Check' approved practices that improve water quality and reduce the amount of stormwater runoff, which supports the health of our local waterways.








Nicholson Street in Hyattsville (Councilmanic District 2)

Homeowner replaced 286 sq. ft. of impervious concrete driveway with permeable pavers.





Somerset Road in Riverdale Park (Councilmanic District 3)

Homeowner installed one (55 gal.) rain barrel treating 25% (280 sq. ft.) of the roof runoff.





Maryland Park Drive in Capitol Heights (Councilmanic District 7) Homeowner removed 891 sq. ft. of impervious asphalt driveway.





Leonard Calvert Drive in Accokeek (Councilmanic District 9)

Homeowner installed a 213 sq. ft. rain garden, treating runoff from the impervious roadway.

Rain Check Rebate Contractor Training

DoE offers a 2-day contractor training course twice a year (spring and fall). It's geared towards landscape professionals wanting to know more about how to plan, design, construct, and maintain the seven Rain Check Rebate practices. Stewardship Grants Program

The Prince George's County Stormwater Stewardship Grant Program (PGCSSGP) funds on-the-ground restoration and program activities that improve communities and water quality and engages County residents in the restoration and protection of local waterways. Funding is made available to all qualified tax-exempt or other 501(c) nonprofit organizations, municipalities, faith-based organizations, educational institutions, community associations, civic groups, homeowners, and businesses.

Eligible activities include water quality improvement, citizen awareness and engagement, technical assistance to churches, tree planting, environmental education, and trash reduction in the Anacostia. Programs must be implemented in the County.

The PGCSSGP process is competitive. Funding partners and an external Technical Review Committee evaluate all applications. The application process typically has a deadline in the late Fall.

DoE has a Cooperative Agreement with the Chesapeake Bay Trust ("CBT" or "Trust") to develop and implement the Prince George's County Stormwater Stewardship and Rain Check Rebate Programs. The Trust is a state agency established by the Maryland General Assembly in 1985 to promote public awareness and participation in the restoration and protection of water quality, aquatic and land resources of the Chesapeake Bay, and its tributaries. The Trust is authorized to provide grants to nonprofit organizations, community associations, civic groups, schools, or public agencies for citizen involvement projects.

FY21 Prince George's Stormwater Stewardship Grant Project Examples

Mount Rainier Elementary School - Impervious Surface Removal (Grant #18986)

Mount Rainier Elementary School received a \$5,000 grant to remove 480 square feet of asphalt at the school. The school no longer used the asphalt area, and the asphalt had become damaged and broken over time. In addition, during rain events, the asphalt contributed to standing water on the adjacent sidewalks and next to the school building. With the asphalt removed, the rainwater can soak into the ground and no longer accumulates on the sidewalks. The school plans to transform the site into an outdoor learning space with benches and native plants.





Defensores de la Cuenca - Academia de Defensores de Cuencas (Watershed **Defenders Academy) (Grant #18994)**

Defensores de la Cuenca received a \$15,000 grant to develop a curriculum and recruitment strategy for the creation of La Academia de Defensores de la Cuenca (La Academia), a program based on the Watershed Stewards Academy model for Spanish-speaking participants. The development of this program is in partnership with Anacostia Watershed Society, which manages the Watershed Stewards Academy for Prince George's County. La Academia will equip participants with knowledge, tools, and resources to



serve as a community leader on watershed issues and solutions. Defensores de la Cuenca held multiple environmentally-focused events to engage the Spanish-speaking community and gain interest in La Academia.
