Renowned 'Arborifessor' will talk trees at Piscataway Park, July 30th

Accokeek, MD, June 19, 2017 – Trees throughout the U.S. Capital region will be in the spotlight this summer when the <u>STIHL Tour des Trees to benefit TREE Fund</u> launches from National Harbor, MD, July 30. Approximately 70 cyclists will ride over 500 miles in week to raise money for tree research and education and raise awareness of the value that mature, healthy trees bring to communities in the greater D.C. metro area. 2017 marks the 25th anniversary of the ride. Over the thousands of miles, the Tour des Trees has been a key means by which <u>TREE Fund</u> has issued over \$3.0 million in direct program grants since 2002 and educated millions of people on the importance of our urban forest.

The Accokeek Foundation will host a tree-mendous event for kids and families as part of the Tour's visit to Accokeek on Sunday, July 30. Toronto arborist and veteran Tour cyclist Warren Hoselton, aka <u>Professor Elwood Pricklethorn</u>, will present a kid-friendly program in tree science at 10:30 am at Piscataway Park (3400 Bryan Point Road, Accokeek, MD 20607).



The Professor's interactive program focuses on how trees grow, where and how to plant a tree so it will live a long life, and what kids can do to care for the trees in their world. At the end of the program the Professor will lead the children in dedicating a tree provided by Chesapeake Natives. In addition, each child will receive a book about trees courtesy of The Davey Tree Expert Company and TREE Fund. The Accokeek Library also will accept a set of books for inclusion in its children's collection.
