


Snow Removal Operations Prince George's County


- > 1,900 lane Miles
- ➤ Budgeted \$6.25 Million Annually
- > Spent in 2016-2017 Winter
- > 75 Pieces SHA Equipment / 250 Pieces Hired Equipment
- > 42,000 Tons of Salt at 10 Salt Domes
- ➤ Anti-Icing using salt Brine applied to Interstate and Primary routes 24 hours prior to each event (weather permitting).

During the winter of 2016-2017 MDOT SHA reached bare pavement on interstate and primary highways within 1.69 hours after the end of frozen precipitation, using 32% less salt per inch of precipitation per lane-mile than during the winter of 2015-2016, while continuing to ensure the safety of the traveling public.

This <u>surpasses</u> our target of bare pavement within 4 hours, while also supporting our environmental stewardship efforts by reducing the amount of salt introduced through winter operations.

How Is the Work Accomplished?

Trucks

- Four x Four and One Ton Four Wheel Drive Trucks
 - Salt Capacity 1 Ton; Plow Size 8 feet
- Six Wheel Dump Truck
 - Salt Capacity 7 Tons; Plow Size 9 feet
- Ten Wheel Dump Truck
 - Salt Capacity 22 Tons; Plow Size 11 feet


Heavy Equipment

How Do We Plow?

- Primary Roads plowed during snowfall
 - Treated only if needed during snowfall
- Collector Roads plowed during snowfall
 - Treated only if needed during snowfall
- Residential Roads plowed after snowfall ends
 - Secondary Roads plowed first
 - Cul-de-sacs and Dead Ends plowed last

Road Condition Definition







Conditions which would allow a passenger vehicle to negotiate the travel path using reasonable care. This usually means that the roadway is snow and/or ice covered and reasonably level, with minimum rutting.





Road Condition Definition





Bare Pavement

Conditions in which 75% or more of the travel lane surface shows. (Bare pavement may include isolated patches of compacted snow/ice of 1" or less.)





Road Condition Definition





Completed

Conditions which provide bare pavement for all travel and turning lanes, including paved shoulders (where applicable).





What's Your Role?

- Off Street Parking
- Never Park on a Snow Emergency Route
- Clear Sidewalks in Front of Your Home
- Clear Driveways and Mailboxes after Plowing Is Completed
- Stay off Roadways, If Possible
 - If not possible, stay as far behind trucks as possible

Helpful Tips

- Reduce speeds to match road conditions during weather events
- Allow as much distance as possible between the car in front of you
- If you think it's too bad to go out, it probably is
- If on street parking is required, park on the even side of the roadway
- Bridges, overpasses and cold spots freeze more quickly
- Wait twenty four (24) hours after the snow stops before calling to request snow and ice removal services
- Double shovel, avoid trouble

2017-2018 Sidewalk Snow & Ice Removal Inspection Program Summary



Program policies

<u>Purpose</u>: To implement the requirements of Section 23-150 of the County Road Ordinance regarding the timely removal of snow and ice from paved sidewalks throughout the County

<u>Applicability</u>: Owners, tenants and managers of commercial and residential properties which have paved sidewalks that are adjacent to their property, accessible to the public and in close proximity to a public roadway.

Requirement: Responsible parties must remove two inches or more of accumulated snow and ice from abutting sidewalks within forty-eight (48) after snow has fallen or ice accumulated as a result of inclement weather or runoff from abutting surfaces.



Focus areas

- Adjacent to <u>commercial establishments</u> and <u>apartment</u> <u>complexes</u> – the main focus of the program
- Along roadways within <u>1.5 miles of a school</u> we have a telephone directory of all County schools
- Along State designated highways
- Along <u>County primary roads</u>
- Abutting major <u>public gathering places</u> like churches, assembly halls, etc.
- In response to public complaints 311
- Residential communities only in response to 311/complaints

 place door hanger warnings on all homes along both sides
 of the block where violation is claimed



Sequence of events

<u>Snow/Ice event triggering criteria</u>: >2 inches accumulation of snow or ice.

<u>24 Hours after end of a major snow event</u> – DPIE Inspection Teams observe assigned areas, issue door hanger warnings, and document results for the day.

48 Hours after end of major snow event – DPIE Inspection Teams revisit assigned areas, issue violation notices/citations where appropriate, and document the results for the day.

Process repeats every day until there are less than 2 inches of snow or ice on sidewalks.



Consequences

<u>Warnings</u>: Those not clearing their abutting sidewalks within 24 hours shall be issued a Reminder Notice/Door Hanger by a DPIE inspector, who shall affix the notice to a conspicuous place on the property or leave a door hanger notice.

<u>Citations</u>: Those not clearing their sidewalks within 24 hours of being issued a Reminder Notice (or 48 hours from the end of the snow event) shall be issued a citation for a fine of \$100.

- Fine of \$100 per day after issuance of first violation notice will be assessed until the snow/ice is cleared.
- Owners of properties not complying with the Sidewalk Snow & Ice Removal regulations which pose a significant danger to pedestrians can be charged the cost of a private contractor to remove accumulated snow and treat ice on sidewalks if not removed in a timely manner.



Post event reporting

Program Manager meets with the Area Managers to discuss results for the aftermath of the storm, including inspection documentation and lessons learned.

Program Manager prepares Event Report on inspection results, issues encountered, lessons learned, corrective actions taken, and suggestions for improvement within two weeks of the end of the enforcement period.

Key statistics produced for each event:

- Inspections performed (blocks covered)
- Initial Violation Reports issued
- Reminder Notices Door Hangers issued
- Subsequent Violation Reports/Citations issued
- 311 complaint calls received (through Inspections Team Lead)
- Other complaint calls received


OEM During Winter Weather


- OEM coordinates information, dissemination manages resource requests, and facilitates multiagency coordination during winter weather.

- The EOC also coordinates with the State and local jurisdictions.


EOC Layout



















Government Roles & Responsibilities

Winter is Coming




- Brings more than just snow

Potomac Temp vs. WM Breaks - Summer


Potomac River Water Temperature vs. Water Main Breaks and Leaks (07/01/2016 - 09/30/2016)

Power Outage

- Typical winter day WSSC Potomac WFP uses about 24,000 – 28,000 kWh of electricity
- Avg. American Home uses 30 kWh/day

Power needed to operate WFP can power more

than 800 homes



Stock Up on Water


- In case of prolonged water disruptions
 - Water Main Break Repairs can take about 6 hours
- Extended power outage can create water restrictions



Snow Operations

- Fire Department starts preparation of vehicles, plows and spreaders in month of October
- All staffing of plow units and salt spreaders is handled thru the PGFD staffing program
- Actual staffing and deployment starts once a Winter Storm Watch has been declared for Prince George's County



Deployment Operations (Level 1)

- Three plows with salt spreaders are placed in service, geographically across the county
- They are responsible for the following:
 - Clearing ramps of fire stations
 - Clearing fuel sites
 - Fire/EMS facilities
 - Fire/EMS office buildings



Deployment Operations (Level 2)

- Three plows plows from Level 1 are still in service
- They are responsible for the following:
 - Clearing ramps of fire stations
 - Clearing fuel sites
 - Fire/EMS facilities
 - Fire/EMS office buildings
 - Ramps and fuel sites are salted



Deployment Operations (Level 2)

- Seven additional plows are placed geographically across the county
- They are responsible for the following:
 - Respond to assist on emergency incidents
 - Assignments as assigned by Incident Commander
 - Fire/EMS facilities



MOU with DPW&T

- Fire Department plows are permitted to obtain salt from any of the County salt domes
- Fire Department plows will not clear or salt any county or state roads unless requested by DPW&T
- All plows and spreaders owned by the Fire Department shall be maintained by Fire Department Apparatus Maintenance

Upon notification from the Office of Emergency Management that an emergency has been declared, a police officer will respond to the Emergency Operations Center to assist in the coordination of services during the emergency.

The Chief of Police may suspend routine patrol depending on the severity of the winter storm. Officers may be assigned to patrol shopping centers and other business areas. Officers will stay of the roadways to allow the snow removal process to continue without interference. The Telephone Reporting Unit may be activated to handle report calls.
