

On Thursday, February 1, 2018 DPW&T hosted 19 delegates from China, including Chongqing Municipal

government employees and representatives from the New Energy Vehicle Research Institute of Chongqing, along with their interpreter. The delegation's visit to the Washington metropolitan area was focused on learning about new energy and smart vehicle development in the U.S.

Upon arriving at DPW&T's Peppercorn Place offices, the delegation was greeted by DPW&T Public Information Officer, Paulette Jones. After that, DPW&T Deputy Director, Gwen Clerkley, and Office of Transportation Associate Director, D'Andrea Walker, provided an overview of the Department with a special focus on our Office of Transportation. Following this presentation, DPW&T Deputy Director, Martin Harris, shared information about autonomous vehicles and the future of transportation, specifically regulations and policies proposed for intelligent transportation and smart vehicles.

Later, the delegation visited Prince George's County's Traffic Response and Information Partnership (TRIP) Center on D'Arcy Road in Forestville. While there, DPW&T's OHM's Traffic Management Operations Division Chief, Hadi Quaiyum, and OHM Engineer IV, Ed Jones, briefed the group on the County's efforts toward adaptive signal technology and other base technology to assist in gathering data for this effort. Overall, it was a successful exchange of ideas for all participants!

PROJECTS AND COLLABORATIONS

MUIRKIRK ROAD/CEDARBROOK LANE/ ODELL ROAD INTERSECTION IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

DPW&T's Office of Engineering & Project Management is happy to announce that the Muirkirk Road/Cedarbrook Lane/Odell Road Intersection Improvement Project is officially completed.

Located in Laurel (Council District 1), the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) project realigned Odell Road to make a four-way intersection with Muirkirk Road and Cedarbrook Lane. The project improves safety for all users of the roadway -- drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists — by adding a full traffic signal. Other additions include sidewalks, turn lanes, a storm drainage system, and landscaping.

Construction on the project started in January 2017 and, just over a year later, the final touches were done in late January 2018.

MARLBORO PIKE PEDESTRIAN SAFETY PROJECT




This summer, DPW&T's Office of Engineering & Project Management is scheduled to begin construction on a Safe Routes to School (SRTS) Capital Improvement Program (CIP) project on Marlboro Pike in District Heights. The project will harness more than \$1 million in federal grant monies.

The SRTS program aims to create safe, convenient, and fun opportunities for children to walk and bike to and from schools.

The Marlboro Pike project will span from Brooks Drive to Weber Drive (just less than 3/4 of a mile) and includes completely replacing and upgrading the sidewalk facilities, ramps, and driveway aprons, and a major upgrade to the existing traffic signal on Marlboro Pike at Brooks Drive.

This project will be a major step forward in improving pedestrian safety on Marlboro Pike -- a roadway that connects the surrounding community and schools with a bustling commercial corridor.

And, the winners are — Tulip Grove Elementary School in Bowie, Baden Elementary School in Brandywine, and Cooper Lane Elementary School in Landover Hills!

Last summer and fall, the Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration (MDOT SHA) teamed up with Chick-fil-A restaurants in our region for the "Look Up, Look Out" pedestrian safety campaign. Students entered a contest for a chance to win a "Look Up, Look Out" assembly at their school — complete with a visit from the Chick-fil-A cow mascot. Tulip Grove Elementary may have its pedestrian safety assembly as early as this spring.

Also, in August 2017, DPW&T participated in the kickoff to MDOT SHA's "Look Up, Look Out" Back to School Safety Campaign at Ridgecrest Elementary School in Hyattsville.

Through the County's Bicycle and Pedestrian Program, DPW&T promotes safety for everyone — bicyclists, pedestrians, and drivers — via such outreach events as DPW&T Street Teams. You never know, they could be coming to a street near you this spring!

The fare is \$1.25


TheBus operates Monday-Friday 6am-7:30pm




Seniors, people with disabilities, and Medicare cardholders ride for free (with proper identification)








Sherif Elkabbani
