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#### **CALL TO ORDER**

The Chair called the meeting to order at 6:35p.m.

#### **INTRODUCTIONS**

Board Members and Law Enforcement Representatives introduced themselves.

#### **BOARD ACTIVITIES AND UPDATES**

Board Member Bryant, Outreach Subcommittee, announced that the Board will participate in the upcoming 2026 Prince George's County Police Department's LGBT Pride Walk and host a table at the event. Additional community outreach events are currently being planned.



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### **LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY HEAD ACTIVITIES AND UPDATES**

Sheriff Carr provided updates on several initiatives within the Office of the Sheriff, including the continued operation of the Citizen's Academy, the Courts in Schools Program, and a free STEM Summer Camp for youth. He also highlighted youth engagement initiatives focused on informed decision-making, domestic violence and mental health. The Silver Circle Program has restarted, which serves senior communities. Assistant Chief Nichols, Prince George's County Police Department, provided updates on the Citizen Police Academy, the Youth Advisory Council consisting of approximately 35 youth ambassadors, the Co-Responder Pilot Program pairing officers with clinicians, and the receipt of a \$50,000 Domestic Violence Grant to support partnerships with nonprofit organizations.

### **BOARD QUESTIONS & DISCUSSION**

The Board discussed concerns regarding off-duty employment and the use of the Roll Call app. Agency representatives emphasized that secondary employment is a privilege, agency duties take priority, and scheduling platforms provide transparency and communication with businesses when coverage changes occur.

The Board also acknowledged the reported 16% reduction in overall crime for 2025 and requested insight into contributing factors. Agency leadership cited strengthened community partnerships, increased inter-agency collaboration, the formation of an Organized Retail Crime Task Force, enhanced data sharing, legislative changes, improved coordination with the State's Attorney's Office, and targeted responses to repeat offenders.

Operational gaps include slow adoption of complaint mediation (partly due to record retention and cultural resistance), body-worn camera compliance issues being addressed with retraining and technology, and staffing/shift patterns creating recruitment and retention pressure. Pilot co-responder mental-health follow-ups aim to reduce repeat crisis calls by connecting residents to services.

The meeting adjourned at 8:40p.m.

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### Q&A Chiefs Meeting

1. The County now requires officers to bid for off-duty work through the RollKall App. Community feedback indicates some officers accept jobs but fail to show up, leaving businesses without coverage and creating public safety concerns. Can the Chiefs help reduce these issues by: a. Standardizing pay rates for off-duty details to prevent double-booking, b. Enforcing a policy that accepted bids are binding and cancellations carry penalties, and c. Mandating that officers communicate a decline within 48 hours?
2. Congratulations on your respective contributions to helping lower overall crime 16% around the county in 2025, what are some of the specific things that are working in the community to lead to this drop?
3. The MPTSC approved the complaint mediation program option in March 2023 (COMAR 12.04.11) where complaints not involving use-of force, or minor Category A and B complaints, may be mediated rather than go to the ACC for disposition. It appears that very few, if any, law enforcement agencies have taken advantage of the opportunity to establish a mediation alternative which has the potential to expedite complaint resolution. Do you all have any insight into why that might be?
4. According to 2025 ACC data, Attention to Duty/Neglect (12%), Use of Force (10%), Unbecoming Conduct (9%), BWC Violation (6%), Discourtesy (6%) and Procedural Violation by an officer represent about half of all allegations against officers. What strategies, if any, have your department implemented to mitigate and reduce these allegations?
5. Considering recent recruitment challenges, what is being done to attract new recruits? What is being done to ensure the standards for new officers are not lowered just to get more recruits in the pipeline?
6. Are there any notable retention strategies that are working to retain officers?
7. Have extensive work shifts had an adverse impact on officer performance?
8. A lot of attention gets given to mitigating discriminatory practices between Law enforcement and the general public, but what measures do you all take to address on-the-job instances of bias or discrimination?



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9. There's been an influx in civilian police auditing through mediums like YouTube, how are officers prepared to deal with these interactions?
10. We've heard from quite a few officers and Chiefs that there is a perception that increased scrutiny of law enforcement will lead to unfair judgments about their performance, has this led to an aversion to addressing minor violations (particularly in traffic), what is being done to still ensure the community is still being kept safe and issues are being addressed?
11. When conducting internal investigations into allegations, what barriers or challenges make it more difficult getting to the truth?
12. As a chief, how do you define success in improving accountability?
13. We understand how Maryland county LEAs will typically collaborate with ICE on undocumented people in custody, but recent interactions around the country between U.S. citizens and ICE have blurred the lines on federal law enforcement and constitutional rights violations, how have your officers been prepared to deal with the nuances of these situations in our county?
